From Equality to Inequality: Social Change among Newly Sedentary Lanoh Hunter-Gatherer Traders of Peninsular Malaysia (2011)

In her book, Dallos reconceptualizes equality and challenges the concept of assertive egalitarianism in small scale societies by discussing social change and its implications for newly sedentary Lanoh hunters and gatherers. She considers the significance of her findings for theories of inequality, and most importantly, for the transition from egalitarian to non-egalitarian, complex, social systems.

Cultures of Migration: The Global Nature of Contemporary Movement (Cohen and Sirkeci 2011)

The authors draw from the fields of anthropology and geography, as well as sociological and economic models, to explore the household-level decision-making process that prompts both international and internal migration. Focusing on his work in Oaxaca, Mexico, Cohen and his co-author propose a model of migration that adds a new dimension to our understanding of the cultural beliefs and social patterns associated with migration and will help specialists better respond to increasing human mobility.

Jeffrey H. Cohen is a professor of anthropology at Ohio State University and a former President of the SEA.
